Respect and Responsibility in the Carpark

Over the last two weeks we have had three incidents where cars have been quite significantly damaged while parked in the car park in front of the school. This is concerning on a number of levels.

It is distressing for the car owners who now have the expense and inconvenience of having to have the damage repaired through no fault of their own. It is also upsetting that the person/ persons who caused the damage did not leave their details on the damaged cars and so take responsibility for the accident. We all know that accidents happen, but the important thing particularly in our Catholic community, is that we take responsibility and show respect for the property of others. Of further concern is the nature of the driving taking place in the carpark that resulted in the accidents occurring. As we are all aware the carpark is a shared zone with high pedestrian traffic and large numbers of young children present. Slow careful driving is essential to ensure the safety of all car park users. If anyone has any information in relation to the car park accidents in the last two weeks it would be appreciated if they could contact the school office.

Facilities at OLOL – Construction Work

As you know construction works to improve the facilities at Our Lady of Lourdes are planned to begin on 6th November, 2017 and are to be completed by Christmas. These works will happen as result of the support of Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta to rectify and or improve the playground facilities for our children. Full details of the scope of works are available in Term 4 Week 2 newsletter.



During the playground construction works, fences will be erected around the work site and the gate entrance near the car park and OOSH will not be available for school use. Therefore, there will be the following adjustments in terms of access to the school.

- All pedestrian access to the school and OOSH will be through the school gate near the Parish office and Kindergarten.
- Children who normally wait in the afternoon on the paved area opposite Year 6 (carline) are to be collected by parents from the hall.

Additional temporary playground space has also been negotiated with Fr Henry during the construction, utilising the areas behind the Parish office and the grass area near the Olive Street gate.

Thank you in anticipation for your cooperation throughout the construction period. We are looking forward to some great new facilities for the children in 2018 and beyond.

Safety
Week**

Next week is Bus Safety week this is a state government initiative to highlight the importance of bus-related safety issues for all road users.

Bus Safety Week is organised by Transport for NSW as part of the 'Be Bus Aware' campaign which aims to reinforce the road rules relating to buses to the community and promote safer on-road interactions between pedestrians, motorists, bicycle riders and buses.

School buses pick up and drop off children on roads all across NSW. Buses use signs and flashing lights to warn drivers that they are picking up and dropping off children. You must slow down to 40km/h when bus lights flash and look out for children crossing the road. Be Bus Aware and help keep our kids safe.

Always hold your child's hand when crossing the road. **School-aged children might seem independent, but they still need a hand. Remember:**

- Always meet your child AT school or the bus stop. NEVER wait on the opposite side of the road and call them across.
- Always supervise your child and hold their hand when walking to and from the bus stop or interchange and when crossing the road until they are at least 10.
- Wait until the bus has gone then use a safe place to cross the road.

Bus safety for children

We all have a part to play.

Our Be Bus Aware campaign highlights the importance of bus safety for all road users. Buses are large, heavy vehicles and can't stop quickly.

Each year, Bus Safety Week helps raise awareness for all road users on how to stay safe on and around buses, helping to reduce injuries and fatalities.

Western Sydney Health Dental Checks

Next Tuesday, November 7th, dental staff from Blacktown/Mount Druitt Dental Clinics will be visiting our school to provide children in Kindergarten, Year 2, Year 4 and Year 6 with a short Oral Health Information and Diet advice talk as well as a free dental assessment. Consent forms were sent home today and should be returned as soon as possible, an information sheet about the service accompanies the consent form. Children are unable to have a dental assessment without a signed permission form.

As part of their unit 'Why Is Australia Unique?' on Tuesday 24th October, Year 1 participated in an incursion exploring the Aboriginal culture with the Jarara Indigenous Education Unit.

Alisha - It was really special learning about Aboriginal culture from Aboriginal people.

Luca - We began the day with a smoking ceremony, and it was to clean us and take away the bad spirits. Joshua said the 'Welcome to Country' and Ayoola lit eucalyptus leaves in a piece of bark. I really liked it a lot.

Isley - First Joshua drew the symbol for gathering in the sand. Then we created Aboriginal symbols by putting glue on paper and sprinkling it with sand and shaking the sand off.



Timothy - I learnt that didgeridoos were made from termites hollowing out the branch or trunk of a tree and then the Aboriginal men would use a stick to dig out any extra wood. Then they used beeswax over the mouth so that it doesn't hurt the mouth when they blow.

Javiar - Joshua played different types of animal sounds on the didgeridoo like the kookaburra, the dingo, the kangaroo and he even played the word "didg-e-ri-doo". I felt really happy inside learning about the first people that lived in Australia.

Tia - We played musical statues where we had to be an Australian animal. Joshua played the didgeridoo and Ayoola was the hunter and pretended to hunt us with a boomerang. It was so much fun!



Sleiman - We painted journey stones using paint to show where we had been.

Evren - We decorated a boomerang with Aboriginal symbols using textas.

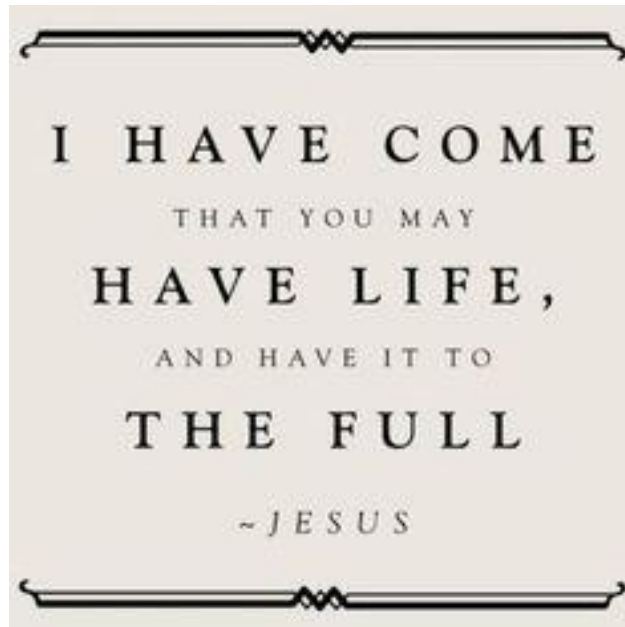
Congratulations and many blessings to these beautiful children who made their First Eucharist on Sunday October 22. Our prayers continue to be with them as they journey on the path of their faith development.

Swim Survive Program

Last week we completed our 8 day Swim Survive program. It was a fantastic experience that all students from Kindergarten to Year Six had the opportunity to participate in. Water safety skills are extremely important for children to develop, especially as we head into the summer months. The students participated in the 'Active Program' teaching a range of skills and knowledge to develop swimming, water safety, survival and basic rescue skills. The program encourages children to have a healthy respect for the aquatic environment and is aligned with the National Swimming and Water Safety framework, developing the following skills:

- Entry and exit skills
- Floating and sculling skills
- Movement and swimming strokes
- Survival and PFD skills
- Underwater skills
- Rescue skills
- Water safety knowledge



We are lucky enough to have Mrs Brogden who is an accredited trainer with Royal Life Saving NSW. Mrs Brogden will continue the theory component of Water Safety with the students in the PDH lessons. The children thoroughly enjoyed this experience and learnt many new skills that they can apply around water.



2018 Diocesan School Fees

Dear parents and carers

Please find below the 2018 Diocesan school fees schedule which includes a modest 3.6% increase on the fees from 2017.

School-based fees will also be limited to a 3.6% increase to ensure we have consistency across our Diocese. School-based fees cover the costs of important things such as technology and school administration.

I appreciate that from time to time, some families might experience financial challenges. With this in mind, I take this opportunity to remind you that confidential fee support is available through

- discounts for families with multiple siblings in our schools
- flexible payment plans
- hardship concession policies for families in need
- the Bishop Manning Scholarship Fund
- the Byawalla Co-contribution Scheme for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families

Diocesan Building Levy - 2018

The Diocesan Building Levy enables us, through our capital works program, to meet the demand for new schools and new classes in high growth areas, and to continue to maintain all schools to a high standard.

All families with one or more children in a Parramatta Diocesan school or at St Dominic's College Kingswood are required to pay the annual Diocese of Parramatta Diocesan Building Levy. This levy has replaced the various building levies that parents previously paid to school building funds (managed by either parishes or schools). **The levy for 2018 is \$783 per family, payable in three equal instalments of \$261 payable in three equal instalments of \$261.**

Annual Diocesan Education Fee Temporary Residents - 2018

The Diocesan Education Fee Temporary Residents for 2018 is **\$1,935 per student, payable in three equal instalments of \$645**. The fee applies to new students on the following visa numbers: 173, 401, 402, 411, 415, 416, 417, 418, 419, 420, 421, 422, 423, 426, 427, 428, 442, 456, 457, 459, 462, 476, 485, 497, 580, 600, 601, 651, 675, 676, 679, 685, 884, 944, 956, 976 and 977 including where any of these are the preceding visas for families on bridging visas 010 to 090.

Families charged this fee in 2013 will continue to be charged on a *per family* basis to the eldest student whilst the family has continuous current students.

Thank you for your continuing support of Catholic education, support that allows us to provide students with exciting learning experiences within our Catholic faith environment.
